Novels by American authors, grammar, vocabulary, and writing will be incorporated.

Grading Policies:

- All work must be submitted on the announced due date.
- For essays and writings, late assignments will be penalized 5 points every 2 days it is late.
- Cheating and plagiarism of any form will result in failure of that particular assignment and possible school disciplinary action. A letter and documentation will become a permanent part of the student's record. Refer to the student handbook p. 26-27.

Tardies, Absences, and Make-up Work

- Three unexcused tardies will result in administrative intervention (see Student Handbook, p. 32).
- When absent, whether excused or unexcused, homework or projects scheduled to be turned in on the day of your absence will be due upon your return to class. One day of absence (excused or unexcused) = one day to make up work. Make-up work not completed within this time frame will result in a ZERO. (See Student Handbook p. 23).
- Tests should be taken on the scheduled day. If you are absent the days prior to an announced test, you will still be expected to take the test upon your return. If you are absent excused on the scheduled test day, it is the student's responsibility to **check Google Classroom** to make up the test. Absent students are responsible for taking announced or missed tests and quizzes on the day they return to school along with submitting any assignments due during the absence.

• If a student is absent, it is his/her responsibility to **check Google Classroom** and make up the work. In general, assignments given in class will also be posted to Google Classroom. I am available to students after school and by appointment.

RESPECT TIME! – When the tardy bell rings, you should be in your seat, ready to begin work. If late to class, even with a pass, do not disrupt instruction. Sign the tardy log, slip the excuse in the front pocket and have a seat!

Late work

- Written assignments/projects weighted as a test or quiz that are not submitted on time, will be penalized 5 points every 2 days it is late.
- Homework passes will be issued for a variety of reasons and can be used in place of only certain homework assignments. Remember that most assignments will be posted to Google Classroom and can be completed digitally!


