ACPS MANILY NEWSLETTER OCTOBER 31, 2022

The school year is well under way and we have completed the first nine weeks. We are one quarter of the way through the school year and overall things are trending in a positive direction. I want to thank our staff and students for all they have done thus far this year. I also want to thank our families and community members for all the support they have shown our students and schools. However, we continue to need to your assistance and I encourage you to #ShowUp for our students and schools. As we move into the second nine weeks of the school year I want to cover a few highlights from the first nine weeks, our school accreditation status, and school safety.

School safety remains a high priority for our schools, central office staff, as well as local and state law enforcement. In alignment with the safety focus, ACPS conducted lockdown safety drills at all of our schools during October. ACPS also participated in the Great Southeast Shakeout (Earthquake Drill) on October 20, 2022. Members of the Amherst County Sheriff's Office, Amherst Town Police, and the Virginia State Police assisted school personnel conduct and evaluate the drills. We are using the information from the drills to assist school safety teams in fine tuning their crisis response plans. We will continue to conduct safety drills throughout the year to ensure we are doing everything within our power to keep our students and staff safe in the event we have a crisis situation.

We encourage our students and families to do their part to assist us in keeping our students and staff safe at our schools. It is imperative that students and families notify school personnel and/or law enforcement if they are aware of a threat situation. We strongly encourage our stakeholders to remember the premise of "See Something, Say Something" and report activities that may pose a threat to our schools.

Student attendance continues to be an area of concern. Students are considered chronically absent if they miss two or more days of school per month. I am encouraging our families to do everything within your power to have your students attend school. It is disheartening to hear that students are absent because their parents have scheduled a vacation during times in which our schools are open. I urge you to try to plan your trips around times when school is not in session. Part of our school accreditation is based on student attendance. For accreditation purposes, the state does not differentiate between excused or unexcused absences. Therefore, it is essential that students are in attendance as much as possible. Student attendance at school is vital to their academic success.

Amherst County Schools met all accreditation standards last year based on the three-year average for our schools. Due to the pandemic, the state waived the attendance portion of the accreditation standards. If attendance had been factored into the accreditation standards ACPS would not have met the attendance requirements. Additionally, although our schools met the SOL testing requirements in our three-year average, we realize that many of our students may have gaps in their knowledge due to school closures and absences from school as a result of the pandemic. To help overcome the effects of the pandemic, ACPS is focusing on providing quality instruction to all of our students on a daily basis. We are identifying areas in need of growth and working to address the individual needs of our students.

However, we need our students and our families to assist us in this process. You can do this by following up with your students at home and contacting your student's teachers if you need additional resources or if you have any concerns regarding your student's progress. Overcoming the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic is not just a school issue and we cannot get our students where they need to be without the support of our families and community. We need our students and our families to be engaged in the education process and that you #ShowUp both physically and mentally. By working together as one team (Team Amherst) we can continue the work of overcoming the effects of the pandemic in our schools and community.

On September 30, 2022 Amherst County Schools conducted the first #ShowUp Day for the school year. Schools from across the division held events to encourage students to attend school as well as recognize students and staff who had "Shown Up" to school on a regular basis. This was truly a community event as we had community members at our schools interacting with our students. Amherst Middle School held a Hometown Heroes Day and had members from the Amherst County Sheriff's Office, Amherst Town Police, Virginia Conservation Police (Game Warden), Virginia State Police Bomb Technicians, Amherst Fire Department, and Amherst County EMS at the school. Students were able to speak with all of the "heroes" and ask them questions about the equipment they had on display as well as career questions. ACPS also had members of the high school football team, cheerleaders, and volleyball team go to some of our elementary schools and interact with our elementary students.

I continue to be impressed by the work of our students and our staff. Although there is work that needs to be done, I am encouraged by what I am observing. I am confident that if we all continue to work together there is nothing that we cannot overcome. I hope everyone has an enjoyable fall season and can spend time with family and friends during the Thanksgiving Holiday. Amherst County Public Schools is conducting a survey of interest about programs to help maintain learning growth in the content areas of reading and math.


The programs are called Learning Academies and will operate during the 2022-2023 school year.

Attendance Tips for Parents





- If your student misses 2 or more days a month, they are considered chronically absent.
- By the end of the school year, a chronically absent student will have missed 16 days or more.
- That's more than 112 hours of instruction!

What happens if my student is chronically absent?

- Students who are chronically absent are more likely to have lower reading levels and lower grades.
- High school students who are chronically absent are more likely to drop out.
- Data shows that adults who were chronically absent as students make less money in their careers.



What can parents do?



- Talk to your student about the importance of education.
- Keep your student on a good sleep schedule with a regular bedtime.
- Take away electronic devices 30 minutes before bedtime to encourage sound sleep.

What if my student needs to be absent?

- Talk with teachers about your student's progress and how you can help keep them on track. Emails are great! You can also ask for a parent-teacher conference.
- Make sure your student completes any missing work.
 - Turn in notes so absences can be excused.

Tips for Parents

What is Bullying?

Bullying is repeated hurtful behaviors that occur over time and are onesided, creating a power imbalance. Peer conflict means both parties are engaging in hurtful behaviors. Peer conflict is not bullying.

What can parents do to prevent bullying?

- Have a good relationship with your child so they feel comfortable talking with you about difficult subjects.
 - Talk with your child about whether it is bullying or peer conflict, then support them through the situation.

 Try not to panic. Hearing that your child is being bullied can cause an emotional response.
